1. Do you agree with the Government's proposal to prohibit the manufacture and sale of personal care products containing microbeads (e.g., body scrubs, facial cleaners, toothpastes) to reduce their impacts on New Zealand's environment and human health? Why/why not?

I strongly commend the Ministry for the Environment for proposing to prohibit or control the manufacture and sale of products containing microbeads rather than waiting for a market based solution.

Given the cumulative nature of the impact of microbeads on fisheries and the environment, and the widespread availability of natural alternatives to microbeads, a ban on their use is deemed an appropriate measure.

2. What are your views on the Government narrowing or widening the definition of the scope of personal care products containing microbeads to be prohibited from manufacture and sale in New Zealand?

I believe that the definition of the scope should be widened to reflect the UN Environment (UNEP) global campaign to eliminate major sources of marine litter, including microplastics in cosmetics and the excessive, wasteful usage of single-use plastic by the year 2022.

In particular microbeads used for texture and consistency in personal care products should be included in the scope.

Given that plastic microbeads are also used in industrial processes such as textile printing, automotive moulding and air blasting the Government is urged to begin researching the potential impacts of microbeads from these products.

Administration and enforcement

I am concerned that the control of microbeads through the Waste Minimisation Act 2008 may not fully capture the breadth of microbead-containing products entering the New Zealand market, particularly through importers who source products from manufacturers who have not committed to ban microbeads in their own products.

Given that there are no New Zealand manufacturers who currently use microbeads in their products, imported goods are the most likely pathway for microbeads to enter the New Zealand environment.

There is an additional risk that excess product from countries who have already imposed a ban may be imported into the New Zealand market if the border control issue is not addressed.

Given that the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment and the Environmental Protection Authority both recommend that regulatory action through the Imports Exports (Restrictions) Act 1988 be pursued, I was surprised to see the Ministry for the Environment proposing actions under the Waste Management Act.

I do not consider action under the Waste Minimisation Act to be the most targeted or effective intervention for managing the impacts of microbeads. Particularly, as regulation under this act wouldn't restrict the importation of goods into New Zealand

Therefore, I would recommend that the Imports Exports (Restrictions) Act 1988 be used.

12. Are there any other considerations for administration and enforcement of the proposed regulations that have not been outlined in the Administration and enforcement section of this consultation document?

Timeframe

13. What are your views on the Government's proposed timeframe for entry-into-force of the regulations under the Waste Minimisation Act to prohibit the manufacture and sale of personal care products containing microbeads?

The Government should ensure that any regulations are implemented at the same time as, or prior to other international legislation banning microbeads to ensure that excess product from countries who have already imposed a ban isn't "dumped" onto New Zealand markets. The Government should also ensure its intended path of action compliments existing international campaigns i.e. UN Environment (UNEP) global campaign to eliminate major sources of marine litter, including microplastics in cosmetics and the excessive, wasteful usage of single-use plastic by the year 2022.

14. Are there any issues about the proposed timeframe for entry-into-force of the regulations that the Government should consider?

While it is encouraging to see the issue of microbeads being addressed i do feel that New Zealand is behind the rest of the world as many countries had already banned or were moving toward banning the products. <http://www.bbc.com/news/uk-37263087>

Other comments

16. Do you have any further comments you wish to make about the Government's proposal?

Having researched this issue of microbeads I would suggest the Government consider and support the Australian Government Senate Committee for Environment and Communications References' recommendation to consider regulatory controls over a range of micro-plastics beyond microbeads. Beyond microbeads, there is strong public support for controls on the issuance of plastic bags and incentives for increased rates of recycling for plastic beverage containers. The common thread between these wastes and microbeads is their detrimental impact on marine and freshwater ecosystems.

Given the current debate on the conditions of our rivers and considering the importance of the New Zealand fishing industry for economic growth and development, I urge the Ministry to investigate other measures which can minimise or eliminate the harmful affects of plastic on our aquatic and marine environments. The time for action is definitely now!
